





Clarence Cemetery Highlight

Exploring the Clarence Cemetery brings so many personal stories to life, with just a little digging online. This particular headstone was placed in memory of P.B. "Bent" Sylvester Jr., after losing his life aboard a steamship near Alaska.

No Word of Bent Sylvester

Months of Suspense and Patient Waiting Bring No Encouragement

P.B. Sylvester has received a letter from Nome, Alaska, forwarded by friends in Seattle who have been helping in the search for word from his son Bent, which brings intelligence that is nearly the last blow. The Nome letter states that a portion of the hull of the little steamer Discovery had been found and that other people who had friends or relatives on the boat had given them up as lost, the steamer having no doubt gone down with all on board.

Sadly, the Clarence Cemetery has seen a great deal of vandalism in the last few years. In an effort to bring awareness to the sanctity of this very special place, the Clarence Cardinal will feature a personal story from the cemetery each month in the newsletter.

Many letters have been written by the Sylvester family and their friends to get some intelligence as to the fate or whereabouts of Bent, but to no avail, and they are now about convinced that they will never see him

again. Some slight relief of mind would come with positive proof of his death, but it seems that even this is denied the family and friends. Particularly has the suspense been a bur-

den to the father and mother, who have received encouraging words from their many friends ever since they received their last letter from Bent dated Unalaska, Oct, 19, 1903. The heart of everyone is touched by this sad conclusion and will extend sympathy to the family. With the letter received from Nome came a few small personal belongings of Bent and later a trunk will come, all of which he had left behind at his boarding house in Seattle when he went to Alaska.

A review of that which has appeared in The Sun and a little additional information may be of interest, so we add it. Bent was employed in electrical work and had been at Nome, Alaska, during the summer of 1903, but left there on the steamer Discovery in early October to return to Seattle for the winter, and should have arrived there about the middle of November. The steamer was wrecked and never reached its destination. Hope that he had not perished in the ocean was revived when the following story appeared in the Seattle Daily Times of Dec. 24th: No passengers were carried on the little steamship Discovery at the time she was wrecked on the Alaskan coast several weeks ago and went down with all on board. Those on board included only the twenty-two members of the crew and four men who were working their passage to Unalaska to Seattle. This information was brought from the north by Water W. Benner of Frederick City, Md., who arrived recently from Unga on the steamship Portland. Benner was a passenger on the Discovery from Unalaska to Unga, together with a number of other persons, but left the steamship at the latter place, refusing to continue with it further on account of the unseaworthy condition of the boat.

At the time the Discovery sailed from Unga she carried but two passengers and they were going only as far as Kodiak and landed those two passengers and as she took no others on at that port, it is now conclusively known that no revenue paying passengers were on her.

"Thirty-four passengers and four work-a-ways boarded the Discovery at Unalaska," said Mr. Benner to The Times this morning. "But the vessel had no sooner left port than they discovered the unseaworthiness of the vessel. While crossing Unimak Pass the vessel encountered a gale in which she suffered severely, even springing a heavy leak.

At one time the captain called all the passengers and crew on deck to lower the small boats, and for a few minutes a panic was threatened. However, discipline prevailed and the boat rode out the storm.

"When the vessel reached Unga thirty-two of the thirty-four passengers left her, eight of them demanding the return of thier passage money, which was refused them. The remaining two passengers were bound only for Kodiak and remained with the vessel until she reached the port.

"Several of those who landed at Unga proceeded on to Valdes. I went to Kodiak and thence came to Seattle on the Portland. The passengers who left the Discovery at Unga did so because they appreciated that she was in no condition to withstand a storm of any kind."

Mr. Sylvester tried to communicate with Mr. Benner but heard only from his mother who said he was in Seattle. Efforts to find him were unsuccessful although his boarding place was located. The mother, who was found at Harrisburg, Pa., refused to answer later letters and it is known that she received letters from others interested in the disaster but does not answer them. The action of the Benners has led to the belief that either Benner's story is untrue or the steamship company are seeking to conceal further information by keeping Benner out of sight and thus avoid possible damage suits. Bent's habit of always keeping his parents posted as to his whereabouts is one strong piece of evidence that he was on the boat when it went down. A letter has been written to the postmaster at Unga, Alaska, a reply to which may bring additional information concerning the wreck.


Pick Up Iowa Event Held by Clarence Main Street
