The route of the Lincoln Highway ran through the Clarence business district long before the road was paved, but after the 1927 paving project, the Clarence Main Street was changed forever.

The Lincoln Highway Middle Third Tour will be passing through Clarence on Thursday, June 19, beginning at approximately 2pm. The tour participants and the entire community are welcomed to Highpoint Event Center for a reception with refreshments and a history display from 2pm to 4pm, and then a dedication of the Lincoln Highway Lamp Post Project at 4pm near the corner of 5th and Lombard. Weather permitting, Kinion Auto will be displaying a number of their classic cars throughout the main street district.

Guests of the Clarence Main Street, and community members alike, are invited to stroll the district, visit the businesses, take in the inter-


# Iowa Barn Foundation Tour Features Cedar County Barns

With summer break officially here, it's a great time to reflect on the past school year. For the North Cedar Bands, this year brought many exciting changes that have led to growth across the program.

At the 5th–8th grade level, we've experienced high levels of recruitment and retention over the last two years. Ms. Addie Shindelar joined the North Cedar staff as the 5th–6th grade band director in the fall of 2023 and has completely reignited our elementary program. The 5th grade band has seen impressive level of participation, with the majority of the class signing up!

The 6th–8th grade bands participated in our in-house solo/ensemble festival, performed in three concerts throughout the year, and had many students selected for honor bands. They also performed at the Southeast Iowa Bandmasters Association (SEIBA) Middle School Large Group Festival, where both groups received high praise from the judges!





The biggest change this year came at the high school level, where the band now rehearses every day for 45 minutes. In previous years, rehearsals were held only two or three times a week—so our rehearsal time has doubled, and we've made the most of those extra minutes!

During marching band season, we performed three unique halftime shows, keeping things exciting all season long as we supported the North Cedar Knights football team. As the year progressed, the concert band continued to grow and improve.

In April, we brought 15 entries to the IHSMA Solo/Small Ensemble Festival and earned six Division I (Superior)

ratings and nine Division II (Excellent) ratings. We ended our year on a high note when the concert band earned a Division I rating at the IHSMA Large Group Festival on May 9th—our first since 2019!


